## The National Campaign to End the Korean War

calls for a permanent peace treaty to replace the temporary Armistice Agreement, thereby achieving an official end to the unresolved Korean War.

We support the establishment of US diplomatic relations with North Korea (DPRK) in order to reduce the tension and mistrust that have defined our relationship for more than half a century since the end of the the Korean War's major hostilities (1950-1953). We promote the adoption of US policies that respect the rights of the Korean people to self-determination, peace, human security and development.

We believe that our nation's approach towards the Korean Peninsula must support the pursuit of dialogue and reconciliation. Beyond the imperative to promote peace in Northeast Asia, we can no longer afford this military standoff in Korea, which has already cost US taxpayers billions of dollars spent on bases, deployments and war games. Peace is the only path to achieve human security and economic prosperity.

## About the NCEKW

The National Campaign to End the Korean War (NCEKW) is a US-based coalition of concerned organizations and individuals, including peace and human rights organizations, faith-based communities, veterans, and academic researchers. We are working together to promote permanent peace on the Korean peninsula and a new US policy toward Korea by informing, educating and mobilizing American people at both local and national levels.

Comprised of more than 50 major national, state and local organizations, the coalition includes as its leading members: National Association of Korean Americans, National Committee for Peace in Korea, National Lawyers Guild - Korean Peace Project, North American Network for Peace in Korea, and Veterans for Peace - Korea Peace Campaign.

## What does the National Campaign do?

Since its launch in 2008, the NCEKW has organized public forums, conferences and other events in New York, DC, LA, Detroit, Philadelphia, Hawaii, and the Northern California Bay Area in order to build awareness in the US about the need for real peace in Korea. The NCEKW sends delegations to Washington, DC, providing information and public education materials to members of Congress and other influential policymakers. NCEKW has coordinated with other national groups to engage in domestic and international campaigns supporting peace.

For 2013 the NCEKW is co-organizing public forums and peace actions in multiple cities to mark the 60-year commemoration of the Armistice Agreement. In 2011 NCEKW co-sponsored the landmark "Unending Korean War" conference at New York University, held in conjunction with documentary film screenings, an art exhibition and public policy discussions. In addition, it has been active in the "Save Jeju" global network to oppose construction of a naval base in South Korea that jeopardizes the fragile ecology of Jeju Island. Challenging the announced shift of US military concentration and assets to the Asia-Pacific, our coalition opposes the expanded militarization of the region, which seriously threatens to raise the risk of conflict and further undermines prospects for peace.
